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Introduction to Arkansas

Arkansas (pronounced as AR-ken-saw) is located in the Southern region of the U.S. Its name is an Algonquian Quapaw Indian word ("Akakaze") meaning "land of the downriver people". The early French explorers then pronounced it as "Arcansas". Arkansas is called "The Natural State" because of the abundance of beautiful lakes and rivers, hills and mountains, forests and delta areas. It is a diverse landscape from the flat farmland of the Mississippi River Delta in the East to the Ozark and Ouachita mountains in the west. Arkansas is also known for its dense forests in the southwest. Arkansas is also known for its hunting and fishing. Arkansas is a "well-kept secret" in its ability to create a down-home atmosphere and a cosmopolitan focus for the arts as well as the medical and business realm.

Little Rock, the capital and largest city of Arkansas, is a small city of approximately 200,000 people. The naming of Little Rock is said to have occurred in 1722 when a French explorer, Benard de la Harpe, was leading a group up the Arkansas River from New Orleans on the Mississippi River and came upon two rock outcroppings - one large and one small - on opposite sides of the River. De la Harpe presumably picked up the name 'little rock' from local Indians to contrast with the 'big rock' two miles further on the other side of the River. It was said the inhabitants of the side of the "little rock" were very hospitable...a fact that remains today!

Arkansas was originally part of the Louisiana Purchase of 1803. What is now part of 15 U.S. states were included in the purchase from France. The total area of Arkansas was part of that 15-million-dollar purchase. President Thomas Jefferson wanted this territory, especially access to the Mississippi river and the port of New Orleans. The territory of Arkansas was admitted to the Union as the 25th state on June 15, 1836. Arkansas ioined the Confederate States of America during the Civil War.

In 1957, world attention was drawn to the Arkansas capital city when Governor Orval E. Faubus and the Arkansas National Guard forcibly tried to prevent the integration of Little Rock Central High School. Integration was mandated by federal law according to a Supreme Court case called Brown vs. the Board of Education. President Dwight D. Eisenhower responded by sending U.S. (Federal) troops to the city with orders to enforce the integration and protect the students. This was one of the first events of the Civil Rights Movement. The 9 brave African American students who were the first to enter Central High were called "The Little Rock Nine"

The state of Arkansas is primarily a rural and agricultural state and the nation's largest producer of rice. Arkansas is also the only place in the U.S. that has a Diamond mine!

Little Rock is also the center of the state's historic, cultural, and economic activity, including hundreds of nonprofit organizations which include Heifer International and Winrock International. Little Rock is the home office or U.S. base for many internationally recognized companies such as Welspun Gujarat Rohren and LM Windpower and Dassault Falcon Jets.

Northwest Arkansas is also home to the world's largest retailer, Wal-Mart, and many national and international industries such as Tyson Foods, and JB Hunt Trucking. The renowned American Art Museum, Crystal Bridges, is also located in the Northwest part of the state. Northwest Arkansas boasts the home of University of Arkansas main campus in Fayetteville, large international companies and the amazing scenery of the Ozarks.

Arkansas is the home state of former President Bill Clinton, Senator J. William Fulbright, the founder of the Fulbright Scholars Program, noted author Maya Angelou, Sam Walton, founder of Wal-Mart, and many notable entertainers, sports icons, politicians and military figures.

Arkansas is a culturally diverse state. The Capital City is home to not only Caucasians and African Americans but also Asian, Middle Eastern and a large and growing number of Latinos from Central America and especially Mexico. The University of Arkansas Little Rock, an urban public University of about 13,000 students, enrolls a large number of International Students and offers International Studies and foreign language programs, as well as a renowned Engineering, Medical and new Cybersecurity program. Little Rock is also home to a Mexican Consulate that serves Mexicans living in the states of Arkansas, Oklahoma and Western Tennessee. The Clinton Presidential Center, the Clinton Foundation and the Clinton School of Public Service have helped make great strides in establishing Little Rock as a city with not only a colorful history but a favorable future.

Weather

Arkansas generally has a humid subtropical climate in spring and summer. While not bordering the Gulf of Mexico, Arkansas is still close enough to this warm, large body of water for it to influence the weather in the state. Generally, Arkansas has hot, humid summers and cold, slightly drier winters. In Little Rock, the daily high temperatures average around 93 degrees Fahrenheit (34 degrees Celsius) with lows around 73 degrees F (23 degrees C) in July. In January highs average around 51 degrees F (11 degrees C) and lows around 32 degrees F (0 degrees C). The annual precipitation throughout the state averages between about 40 and 60 inches (1,000 and 1,500 mm). Snowfall is infrequent and the area surrounding Little Rock is more apt to see ice storms. Northwest Arkansas experiences both ice and snow fall during the winter.

The research conducted at the RREC is primarily field-oriented, problem-solving, and applied. COMMUNITY POLICING AND CRIME PREVENTION

These programs encompass community policing which involves collaboration of law enforcement officers with members of the community, neighborhood watch programs, youth programs such as mentorship, and environmental designing that can improve lighting and installation of security cameras.

Chief of Police, Little Rock

Chief Heath Helton is a 27 year veteran of the Little Rock Police Department. He began his career in 1996 as a Police Officer. The chief is a military veteran having served 8 years in the US Army Reserve. Chief Helton can speak with the visitors about administering a police department, leadership skills, and effective recruitment.

Community Cooking

This is a youth program partnership between a local restaurant and the Little Rock Police Department. Community Cooking is a program designed to provide positive role models for today's youth ages thirteen through eighteen. The overall goal of Community Cooking is to bring the community, law enforcement, and local businesses and chefs together to prepare our youth for a future of success.

The Crime Prevention Unit works to develop and promote positive community relations and interaction through proactive policing techniques. They implement new programs to help identify problems and seek solutions; they host and attend community meetings, acting as a liaison for community agencies, and conducting special events to foster and increase community relations. The focus is to educate the community on proactive measures of preventing criminal activity to property, and equipping citizens on measures of protecting themselves.

<u>LR Mounted Patrol</u> is a community outreach program that is committed to building positive relationships between law enforcement and the public. You can see the mounted patrol in the downtown area, local schools, concerts, and many more places in the Little Rock area.

LRPD Social Worker

A newly created position to lead crisis intervention within the Little Rock Police Department has been created, Funding for the position comes from the annual Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant from the U.S. Department of Justice. The Little Rock Police Department continues to prioritize crisis intervention and violence prevention as a 21st century police force guided by principles of service to residents

<u>Special Operations LR Police Department.</u>

The Special Operations Division is a specialized unit within the LRPD that is responsible for handling various high-risk situations that require a specialized tactical response. It is composed of several units, including the SWAT team, Bomb Squad, Crisis Negotiation Team, and Canine Unit. The department is trained to handle situations such as hostage situations, barricaded suspects, high-risk warrant service, dignitary protection, and other critical incidents that require specialized tactics and equipment. The team is highly trained and equipped with specialized weapons and equipment to carry out their duties. They also work closely with other law enforcement agencies in the region to provide support and assistance when needed.

Domestic Violence

Little Rock Police Department has a Domestic Violence Unit that is responsible for investigating and responding to domestic violence incidents within their jurisdiction. The specific functions of this unit may include: responding to calls for service, providing resources such as obtaining protective orders for victims, conducting community outreach programs, and much more.

<u>FBI</u>, <u>Federal Bureau of Investigation</u>, is a national law enforcement agency with an area office in Little Rock. The primary function is to investigate and enforce federal criminal laws, including those related to terrorism, organized crime, cybercrime, public corruption, civil rights violations, and white collar crime.

<u>FBI Community Outreach</u> is responsible for building and maintaining positive relationships between the FBI and the communities it serves. This division works to improve communication and understanding between the FBI and community groups, such as civic organizations, religious groups, and minority groups.

<u>Arkansas State Police</u> is the primary law enforcement agency in the state. Its main function is to enforce state laws and regulations, maintain public safety and order, and investigate and solve crimes.

<u>Tour Regional Detention Facility</u> is also known as the Pulaski County jail. This correctional institution is located in Little Rock. Its primary function is to hold individuals who have been arrested and are awaiting trial or sentencing, or have committed a crime and are serving a sentence of less than one year.

Attorney General's office K9 unit

There is a new addition to the Arkansas attorney general's K-9 unit named Lucy! This is a highly trained dog that will be used to assist in various law enforcement tasks, such as detecting illegal substances or tracking missing persons. K-9 units are a valuable asset to law enforcement agencies, and their specially trained dogs play an important role in keeping communities safe.

<u>Pulaski County Sheriff's Department's</u> role typically includes maintaining law and order within their jurisdiction, enforcing state and local laws, investigating crimes, providing security and support during emergencies, and operating and maintaining county jails or detention facilities. Sheriff's Offices may also have specialized units for traffic enforcement, search and rescue operations, and community outreach programs. It is important to note that the specific duties of a Sheriff's Office may vary depending on the size of the jurisdiction, the resources available, and the needs of the community.

At Risk Youth Programs: Coach Larry with Life Skills Youth. The goal of LSY is to create a positive alternative for youth in the community while offering mentorship and skills development that will aid them into adulthood. Since 2007 LSY has earned numerous awards for its commitment to the youth in the local community. Since its inception LSY has helped over 3,800 Youth, served over 1,562,100 million healthy meals and snacks and touched the lives of countless families. The core of LSY is programs that mentor, teach and train youth. LSY is known nationally for its cutting edge ATM (Anger, Time and Money) Management that teaches youth how to manage emotions, plan time and handle money responsibly. PARK (Positive Atmosphere Reaches Kids) is another great organization run by former pro football player Keith Jackson.

<u>The Mexican Consulate</u> located in Little Rock provides a range of services to Mexican citizens in the area, as well as to individuals seeking to visit or do business in Mexico.

<u>LRPD Hispanic Police Units</u> are specialized units within police departments that are made up of officers who are fluent in Spanish and are trained to work with the Hispanic community. These units are typically formed in areas where there is a large Hispanic population or where there is a need for Spanish speaking officers to better serve the community.

CYBERSECURITY

Cybersecurity expert, Chris Wright Chris graduated with a Computer Engineering degree from the University of Arkansas but aspired to be a pilot in the US Air Force. He quickly realized the pilot's seat would not give him the satisfaction of solving difficult engineering problems and making a real difference in the world, so he transferred into the Engineering and IT career field. Since he first learned to code in the 3rd grade, Chris somehow knew he'd make a difference with technology. After a few years, he found himself working in cybersecurity, securing systems vital to Air Force Space Command, Medicare and Medicaid, Homeland Security, and other government agencies. After traveling the world for 13 years, he came back home to Arkansas and continued his cyber security work with FIS, a global financial technology company. After a few years, he saw a new need and went into business for himself to use his expertise for the benefit of small businesses.

In addition to his bachelor's degree in Engineering, Chris also holds a master's degree in Management Information Systems. He is also a Certified Information Systems Security Professional (CISSP) and Certified Ethical Hacker (CEH).

University of Arkansas, Little Rock Cybersecurity Department

UA Little Rock works with the U.S. Cyber Command and the Department of Defense to provide research, educational and partnership opportunities in the field of cybersecurity. UALR is one of 84 universities chosen for the Cyber Command's newly formed Academic Engagement Network (AEN). This is an alliance of public and private academic institutions collaborating to support and enhance four US Cyber Command lines of efforts: future workforce, applied cyber research, applied analytics and strategic issues. UALR also manages the Cyber Arena which provides cloud-based cybersecurity workouts.

DISASTER PREPAREDNESS AND EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Arkansas Department of Emergency Management (ADEM): ADEM is the state's agency for homeland security and preparedness, serving as the state's coordination center to prevent, protect against, and mitigate the effects of security threats. ADEM also houses the State's Emergency Operations Center (SEOC), which coordinates representatives from various state agencies to deliver assistance. You will visit ADEM to gain an understanding of the state's emergency plans and roles; the session will also highlight the types of emergencies for which the state prepares.

Special attention will be paid to efforts to reach rural communities with services and information.

Arkansas Department of Health (ADH): The ADH Emergency Response and Preparedness program coordinates training and exercises tailored for public health emergency response. These training and exercise programs are designed to enhance the capacity of the health and medical systems to respond to and recover from catastrophic health emergencies which could include incidents of terrorism, pandemic outbreaks, or a large-scale evacuation. ADH representatives will detail their approach to

training and exercises for public health professionals and discuss efforts to prepare for health emergencies.

<u>The University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences (UAMS)</u>: UAMS is the premier medical teaching and research hospital in the state. <u>Arkansas Legislature</u>--we can view the House of Representatives and Senate when in session, and ask for appointments with specific legislators

Special Capitol Tour with Lobbyist, Randy Thurman. Mr. Randy Thurman is currently a Lobbyist working for clients such as Arkansas Hospital Association and Exxonmobil. He served in the Arkansas State house of Representatives from 1989-1994, while Bill Clinton was Governor of Arkansas. He then joined the Arkansas Environmental Federation, a non-profit association of industries with environmental concerns. As a legislator, Mr. Thurman served on the Transportation, Education, Public Health, Labor & Welfare, Aging & Legislative Affairs, and Agriculture and Economic Development Committees.

<u>Arkansas National Guard</u>--Comprised of both Army and Air National Guard troops, their mission is to provide trained and disciplined forces for domestic emergencies or as otherwise provided by state law.

<u>Arkansas State Capitol Tour</u>--Tour the capitol with a Lobbyist who will tell us about the history and politics of Arkansas and the US with humor

<u>Arkansas Supreme Court</u>--we can sit in on trials and hearings, as well as meet judges, with appropriate notice.

<u>Attorney General</u>--serves as Arkansas's lawyer, chief law enforcement officer and chief consumer advocate.

<u>Bureau of Legislative Research</u>- provides research of all kinds, drafting of bills, committee staffing, review of state agency rules, codification of laws, and maintenance of the computer services for the entire Capitol.

Consulate of Mexico--provides many legal services for Mexican citizens in Little Rock

<u>Governor's Office</u>--we can request an appointment with the Governor Sarah Sanders and/or staff.

<u>Judicial Discipline and Disability Commission</u>--investigates and may take disciplinary action or, in the most serious cases, recommend to the Arkansas Supreme Court that it impose discipline upon a judge whose actions are found to be a violation of the Code of Judicial Conduct.

<u>Little Rock Air Force Base (LRAFB)</u>--Actually in Jacksonville, 15 miles north, LRAFB is home of the 19th Airlift Wing. Two tenant units, the 314th Airlift Wing and the 189th Airlift Wing (Arkansas Air National Guard) report to Air Education and Training Command. A third tenant unit, the U.S. Air Mobility Weapons School reports to Air Combat Command.

<u>Local Offices of US Senators and Representatives</u>--both Senators have offices in Little Rock, as well as the Representative from the 2nd District

State Representative Denise Ennett (D)

Representative Ennett will give an overview of Democratic priorities/top issues in the state. Rep. Denise Jones Ennett is serving her third term in the Arkansas House of Representatives. Ennett serves on the House Public Transportation Committee, the House Insurance and Commerce Committee, and the House.

National Archives and Records Administration (NARA)

NARA appointed Jay Barth as the Director of the William J. Clinton Presidential Library and Museum. Barth brings to this position nearly three decades of experience teaching and researching various aspects of American politics, along with work enhancing civic engagement programming in higher education settings. He began his career as a member of the Department of Politics at Hendrix College in Conway, Arkansas. In addition to his 26 years as a faculty member at Hendrix, Barth was a member of the inaugural faculty for the University of Arkansas's Clinton School of Public Service and has taught at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock William H. Bowen School of Law. Since taking emeritus status at Hendrix in late 2019, Barth has been the Chief Education Officer for the City of Little Rock, where he has coordinated the city's work to support education from birth through higher education. From 2012 to 2019, Barth was a member of the Arkansas State Board of Education, chairing that body for two years.

WOMEN'S SERVICES & EMPOWERMENT

<u>ABBA House</u>--established by the Catholic Diocese of Little Rock in 1981 to offer a home to pregnant women and their children who have no place to go. It also serves as an emergency shelter for homeless women.

<u>Center for Women in Transition</u>--Life Skills Education to women and teen girls who are incarcerated, and Transitional Reentry Services to adult women who have recently been released from prison or jail.

<u>Dorcas House-</u>-provides a safe, Christian environment for women and children who are victims of domestic violence.

<u>Esse Purse Museum--</u>honors and celebrates the progression of the 20th-century American woman – decade by decade – through the lens of her handbag and the contents within.

<u>Women and Children First</u>--provides crisis hotline, emergency shelter, full support services for in-house clients, court advocacy, a children's program, and community outreach for women suffering domestic violence.

<u>Women's Foundation of Arkansas</u>--dedicated to improving the economic viability of women and girls through focused philanthropic efforts in the areas of education, including the Girls of Promise camp, which encourages 8th grade girls to enter STEM fields.

YOUTH SERVICES

The Little Rock Workforce Development Board (LRWDB) seeks to provide a variety of training and educational opportunities for youth that lead to positive job experiences and career prospects. Services to develop career readiness, occupational skills, and work experience are available at no charge for individuals who meet income and eligibility requirements. WIOA (Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act) Youth Services for ages 14 – 21, focus primarily on: Tutoring, mentoring, and leadership development services; career counseling and occupational skills training; and paid and unpaid work experiences.

Mr. Sanders oversees the Summer Youth Employment program. This program gives youth opportunities to learn about careers while earning wages during the summer. Community business partners offer summer positions as a partner with the City of Little Rock, New Futures for Youth, and community stakeholders to develop the critical skills necessary to be successful members of the workforce. As a business partner, businesses are asked to teach youth the value of earning a salary which encourages them to build employability skills and work ethic leading down a pathway to productive employment.

Arkansas Division of Workforce Services The Arkansas Career Development Center (formerly the Arkansas Career Training Institute) provides vocational training and services that lead to employment opportunities for students served by Arkansas Rehabilitation Services (ARS).

Arkansas Attorney General Leslie Rutledge Internship Program. College students have the opportunity to learn about public service and gain valuable, real-world experience by participating in the Attorney General's internship program.

A nonprofit national education association, SkillsUSA serves middle-school, high-school and college/postsecondary students preparing for careers in trade, technical and skilled service (including health) occupations.

<u>Arkansas Department of Education</u>- <u>Division of Career and Technical Education</u>
<u>Youth Apprenticeship</u> A paid work experience designed to assist students in grades 11 - 12 in their specific Career and Technical Education (CTE) career pathway.

Pre-Apprenticeship Designed to prepare students for entry into a Department of Labor registered apprenticeship program. It is a paid Pre-Apprenticeship.

Related Legislation

The "Arkansas Youth Apprenticeship/Work-Based Learning Act of 1991" (A.C.A. 6 50-501 to 6-50-505) establishes the state's youth apprenticeship program. The program begins in the 11th grade and lasts three to four years. It ends with the attainment of a postsecondary associate degree, certificate and/or completion of a traditional apprenticeship. Programs must be approved by the State Apprenticeship Coordination Steering Committee.Two Arkansas laws provide tax incentives for employers hiring a youth apprentice in a program registered with the U.S. Department of Labor and/or in a program approved by the Arkansas Department of Career Education.

Arkansas Department of Education- Occupational Areas

Trade and Industry Group of instructional programs that prepare students to apply technical knowledge and skills in one or more trade, technical, and/or professional occupations. Students will engage in activities and instruction enabling them to use, create, problem and control various technology resources; people, tools, machines, information, materials, energy, capital, and time.

Family and Consumer Sciences Prepares students to make informed choices regarding consumer education, food and nutrition, relationships, housing, and textiles and provides skills for careers in the Hospitality and Tourism, Education and Training, and Human Services career clusters.

Agricultural Education Prepares students for successful careers and a lifetime of informed choices in the global agriculture, food, fiber and natural resources systems. Students are provided opportunities for leadership development, personal growth, and career success. Agricultural Education instruction is delivered through three major components: 1) Classroom/laboratory instruction (contextual learning), 2) supervised agricultural experience programs (work-based learning), and 3) student leadership opportunities and organizations (National FFA Organization).

The Business and Marketing Department Administers a variety of programs and courses to help prepare students for college degrees and career fields in the business arena. Career and Technical Student Organizations FBLA and DECA offer a differentiated and application-based curriculum for students pursuing a career focus in a business program, bringing relevance and real-world connections to the classroom. The department is working to increase the number of industry certifications achieved by Arkansas students. It is the mission of the Business and Marketing Department that

every student who completes a business program of study has the skills and credentials to achieve a successful career in their chosen field.

<u>Arkansas 4-H.</u> Premier youth development program conducted by the University of Arkansas, Division of Agriculture, Cooperative Extension Service. Through non-formal, science-based, experiential education activities, 4-H participants gain knowledge and enhance life skills enabling them to become positive, productive, capable and compassionate members of society.

For over 100 years, 4-H has engaged young people in cutting-edge science learning, including areas such as animal science, food science, welding, electricity, and

plant/crop science. More recent project areas include aerospace, robotics, geospatial technologies, computer science, and multimedia.

<u>Clinton School of Public Service</u> The first school in the nation to offer a Master of Public Service (MPS) degree, the University of Arkansas Clinton School of Public Service gives students the knowledge and experience to further their careers in the areas of nonprofit, governmental, volunteer or private sector service. While learning valuable lessons in the classroom, Clinton School students also complete "hands-on" public service projects, ranging from local work in Arkansas communities, to international projects on all of the world's six inhabited continents.

<u>EAST Education Accelerated by Service and Technology</u>. Transforms schools and communities by empowering people with technology, by encouraging critical thinking and creative problem-solving, and by engaging them in positive, real-world experiences; and advocates lifelong learning and community service. In addition to establishing unique environments in schools and offering technical support, EAST also provides powerful technology training both to students and educators, including professional development focusing on integrating technology into any classroom, regardless of subject.

<u>Project Lead the Way Administered by Arkansas State University,</u> this special educational program works in K-12 grade schools to develop interest in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) fields and provide practical experiences for students in Computer Science and Engineering.

<u>Arkansas Farm Bureau Education</u> Provides two key programs for youth:

Ag Youth Leadership Seminar Provides participants with an in-depth look at agricultural degrees and careers, as well as an introduction to the policy development process and issues affecting agriculture and rural Arkansas. AYLS participants will be given the chance to tour and learn about several aspects of the agricultural industry such as; agriculture agencies and companies, on-farm tours, a look into agricultural technologies, and a tour of the Arkansas State Capitol. The seminar will give participants a look at career opportunities in agriculture and what educational path is needed for those careers.

M*A*S*H (Medical Applications of Science for Health) is a program designed for students interested in a career in the medical field. The two-week camps are free, and take place at various locations around the state. Students who attend the camps are given a unique look into the healthcare industry while shadowing medical professionals. FACTS About Arkansas Farm Bureau: Ranks 1st in the nation in rice production, producing close to 50 percent of the nation's rice. More than 60 percent of the rice produced in Arkansas is exported.

Vision 2025 is an innovative program identifying young women in the 9th through 12th grades with extraordinary potential and empowers them as leaders. The yearlong program focuses on empowerment, building leadership skills, mentoring, community service, academic enrichment, and academic & career advising. Young women engage in activities including tutoring, college tours, leadership conferences, service-learning, ACT prep, cultural enrichment, health and nutrition education, physical fitness, professional development workshops, self-esteem building opportunities, etiquette coaching dinners, college readiness workshops, and much more!

The Suit to Success program's goal was simple – provide a suit to young men from underserved areas of Pulaski County. Youth Services collects donations of new or gently worn suits and business wear accessories for those youth trying to interview for employment.

<u>The Innovation Hub</u> is a non profit organization dedicated to improving the lives of Arkansans by inspiring innovation and expanding opportunities. The state-of-the-art facilities have provided tools and training to entrepreneurs, students and other makers, preparing them to join and grow Arkansas's economic ecosystem. The Innovation Hub uses tools, skills, and expertise to inspire innovators and entrepreneurs who expand the range of educational and economic opportunities for themselves, for their communities, for the state and throughout the world.

Children International at UALR. CI is located in 11 countries worldwide. The program in Little Rock is the only US based program. The aim for the partnership is to empower families to raise healthy, educated, self-reliant children. To achieve this, UA Little Rock CI has partnered with schools in the Little Rock School District serving the neighborhoods of Central and Southwest Little Rock. Of the 10 countries that Children International serves, the UA Little Rock Children International location is the only U.S. site. Each year, the site serves approximately 2,600 children and youth with the help of 30+ partner organizations and more than 10,000 individual sponsors from around the world. Programs focus on four key outcomes: for CI kids to graduate healthy, educated, empowered, and employed. Why these four? Because they're all interconnected and essential to achieving the big goal: helping to break the cycle of poverty.

The Arkansas Commitment Program is a nonprofit organization created to identify academically talented African-American high school students throughout central Arkansas and guide them to become leaders in Arkansas. Arkansas Commitment works to ensure future diversity in every aspect of the Arkansas community and to retain talented young Arkansans.

<u>Arkansas National Guard Youth Challenge</u>--established by the National Guard in 1993 to turn around the lives of young men and women between the ages of 16 and 18 who are experiencing difficulty in completing traditional high school.

<u>Arkansas 4-H Center (Vines Center)</u>--nestled in the foothills of the Ouachita Mountains just 10 miles west of Little Rock, the Vines Center provides lodging, a dining hall serving breakfast lunch and dinner, and fully customizable programs providing valuable and challenging team building for both youth and adults.

<u>Big Brothers, Big Sisters of Central Arkansas-</u>-provides children facing adversity with strong and enduring, professionally supported 1-to-1 mentoring relationships that change their lives for the better, forever. They have both school tutoring and community programs.

<u>Boys and Girls Club of Central Arkansas</u>--provide activities in character and leadership development, education and career development, health and life skills, the arts, and sports/fitness/recreation as well as summer STEM camps.

<u>Center for Youth and Family-</u>-provides specialized prevention, treatment and intervention services that promote emotional and social wellness for children and families in Arkansas, including a treatment center for human trafficking victims.

<u>City Year-</u>-deploys highly trained AmeriCorps members to tutor and mentor at-risk students, reclaim public spaces, and organize important after-school programs in six Little Rock public schools.

<u>Juvenile Detention Center--</u>provides a safe and secure environment that meets or exceeds standards and delivers meaningful rehabilitative programs for detained juveniles.

<u>Little Rock Central High School National Historic Site Youth Leadership Academy</u> --involves young leaders at the Historic Site to promote volunteerism, nonviolence, youth empowerment and stewardship for the National Park Service.

<u>Pulaski County Youth Services</u>-works in collaboration with schools, nonprofits, and community partners to encourage academic achievement, build character, inspire leadership, develop life skills, and nurture healthy habits in the youth of Pulaski County.

<u>STEP Ministries</u>--a Christian organization which provides mentors for at-risk school age children and youth in Pulaski County.

PARK. Positive Atmosphere Reaches Kids

Twenty-five years ago, Keith Jackson put P.A.R.K. – Positive Atmosphere Reaches Kids – in motion. The nonprofit organization based in southwest Little Rock provides after-school and summer programming to keep kids engaged in activities and off the

streets. It also emphasizes homework and doing well in school. Over the last quarter-century, there have been 540 kids that have graduated from the program, but Jackson said the real legacy will stretch far beyond those numbers.

Keith Jackson was born on April 19, 1965, in Little Rock, Arkansas. He began playing football at the age of 9 with the Sunset Tigers at Parkview High School. Keith attended and was graduated with academic honors and a B.A. in Communications in three and a half years from the University of Oklahoma (1984-1988). He attended school on a football scholarship as a tight end where he assisted the Sooners to a 42-5-1 record and a national championship in 1985.

Life Skills for Youth, Coach Larry Clark Sr.

The goal of LSY is to create a positive alternative for youth in the community while offering mentorship and skills development that will aid them into adulthood. Since 2007 LSY has earned numerous awards for its commitment to the youth in the local community. Since its inception LSY has helped over 3,800 Youth, served over 1,562,100 million healthy meals and snacks and touched the lives of countless families. The core of LSY is programs that mentor, teach and train youth. LSY is known nationally for its cutting-edge ATM (Anger, Time and Money) Management that teaches youth how to manage emotions, plan time and handle money responsibly.
